
Coconut could win an award for the loudest purr! When she went to the veterinarian for her first exam, the vet heard a "gallop" rhythm in her heart. A recheck was scheduled prior to the time Coconut would be spayed. Almost overnight, Coconut became lethargic and didn't want to eat. Since it was Christmas her vet was closed so she went to see another veterinarian. This one heard what she described as a very rapid, harsh heartbeat and recommended an echocardiogram. Fortunately, there was an opening the

next day with CVCA Cardiac Care for Pets in Cary. The cardiologist noted murmurs with both the tricuspid and mitral valves but didn't feel they warranted delaying spay.

Coconut remained sick. She began to develop lower Gl issues. A third veterinarian recommended a prescription diet, dewormer, antibiotic and an appetite stimulant. Bloodwork was completed over two different dates to rule out other illnesses but it remained fairly normal. With a lot of TLC and multiple small meals daily for the next several weeks, Coconut slowly gained weight. Before we knew it, she was a playful kitten once again! She and her "brother" Mango were adopted together in February 2023.

2022 was a turnaround year for Coconut!

3 for Free Spay or Neuter — Meeting a Community Need

We asked, and you answered, BIG TIME!

No, it is not Buy one and get 3 for free (or: Adopt one and get 3 for free), but CARE's most successful campaign in 2022 aimed at reducing pet overpopulation in Chatham County. The 3 for Free campaign offered low-income families who qualified for CARE's Lillie's Fund to spay up to 3 female dogs or cats for free, with no co-pays required. The response to CARE's free-for-females incentive was heartening. With the assistance of CARE's wonderful participating veterinarians, we succeeded in spaying 116 female dogs and cats. Many of those spayed were in heat or pregnant. The small number of 3 (for free) contributed directly to the exponentially larger number of spays which in turn prevented an even greater number of unwanted litters of kittens and puppies from being neglected, abandoned or surrendered to the shelter.

Thanks to all of CARE's donors in 2022 who gave in small ways (or large) to CARE's mission. Every donation counts [or: has an impact larger than the \$ amount; or has a ripple effect beyond....] as we have learned from 3 for Free. *Your generosity is humbling and we thank you.*
